From the Minister



I have had two emails this week from the USA advising on how churches can protect themselves from people with guns seeking to commit mass shootings. This is after the latest disaster in a small church in rural Texas where a shooter killed 25 worshippers. Some label him bad others call him mad, but it is a terrible tragedy where innocent people are caught up in the destructive violence of others. Some of these emails go on about the harsh realities of evil in our world and the necessity to protect the people in our churches. Thankfully we don't need metal detectors in Churches in NZ or armed security guards but it reminds us of the vulnerable people in our world for who violence and fear is a daily occurrence.

It reminds me of the story in Matthew 2:16-18 where all the baby

boys in Bethlehem under two were killed by Herod when felt threatened by the possibility of a new king as predicted by the Wise men. Some estimate this at about 20 deaths – hardly a news worthy event in a country ruled by a despot who killed his own sons and mother. This is a part of the Christmas story we never like so much, it certainly doesn't feature in our nativity scenes or Christmas cards.

Yet that story also pales in comparison to the 65 million people who have been displaced this year due to war (like Syria) or the actions of militias like the Rohingya of Myanmar or the poverty of Ethiopia or even the plight of the 600 refugees in Manus Island who have featured in our news this week.

This Christmas as we celebrate that Jesus came into our broken and hurting world to bring peace and reconciliation maybe we should contemplate for a moment the world he entered. Does the world still need a voice of hope? Does the world still need peace? Does the world still need to know that God has not abandoned us in our suffering and selfishness? If so maybe we need Christmas more than ever and the Church needs to

be not just enjoying cute nativity plays and carol services but actively promoting Jesus as the voice of hope, the bringer of peace and agent of God's reconciling love.

This Christmas maybe we also need to be more active participants in the work that Jesus came to do. In one sense Christmas is not just about God's agenda to bring Hope peace and reconciliation –but about seeking active agents in the task of accomplishing these things. I always recall a play I saw years ago about where God was asking who will enter into the mess, who will risk suffering, who will pay the price of love and all the other participants kept looking at each other – so God said I will go myself – and so Jesus came.

We can be active participants in God's agenda in a number of ways

this year. We can give our money to the Christmas appeal where the Christian World Service act on behalf of Churches to relieve poverty and bring hope. We can invite people to our Christmas services to hear of what God has done and what God is doing. We can take action by offering hospitality, forgiving those who have offended you, offering grace and help to those who haven't earned it.

A theme for our services in the past month or so has been "Painting the earth with the colours of heaven." May you paint the earth the colours of hope and peace and reconciliation this Christmas.

However, today these signs would never work. People wouldn't see it let alone read it, and yet it is good advice. It would be good for us to briefly consider these three words. Stop, look and listen.

The Holy Spirit by Allan Cochran

When I read a short article in the April issue of “Halo” and saw my name featured with two others, it was asking if I could write how the Holy Spirit had affected our lives.

To start with, I wonder how many of our church congregation personally know the Holy Spirit other than that of which is written in scripture. Father, Son and Holy Spirit, or Holy Ghost in some translations. The three-in-one triune God. The Holy Spirit referred to in the book of Acts by Jesus, who, before He departed the earth, said to His disciples that He would leave with them “The Comforter” (The Holy Spirit by another name).

There are some of us who are familiar with these basics and probably some who are like I was for many years. I was brought up in the Presbyterian Church. My parents dedicated my life to The Lord when I was a baby. I had Sunday School and Bible Class as I grew up and although I gave my heart to the Lord when I was eight years old, I spent the following nineteen years fitting the mould of religiously going to church but hardly ever looked at my Bible. I was an adherent, a religious person, a pew-sitter.

At the age of 27, after suffering a back injury, I left home and my work as a general and structural engineer. I moved to Queenstown and sat for a bus driver’s licence to drive tourist coaches. I sat for a taxi licence as well. For many years I worked around the Southern Lakes district. At the age of 37, I was driving a long distance taxi out of Te Anau on tour work. It involved a lot of time visiting hotels. An unhealthy life having all my meals at hotels laced with too much grog. However, the Holy Spirit was watching over me as my protector.

One night I went home to my accommodation feeling empty and a little depressed and as I sat on my bed I heard the audible voice of the Holy Spirit calling my name and saying “Allan, I want you back”. The next evening, I received a phone call from a tourist operator in Queenstown offering me work for the upcoming season and beyond. How very convenient – thankyou Lord for the opportunity to make a clean break. I took up with the offer and went to Queenstown, and found that the Salvation Army had evening church meetings, and there I found a new life with Christ at the centre. I made lots of new friends at Bible study and prayer groups, and

we encouraged each other with new things we had sought the Lord's revelation on.

The book of Acts tells us lots about the workings and gifts of the Holy Spirit. First, we need to commit our lives to Jesus Christ, to accept Him



as our Lord and Saviour, as we repent (turn away) from our old evil ways. As we receive Jesus into our hearts we have died to self and become new creatures in Him. We are born again. Jesus said in the gospel of John 3:3, "Most assuredly I say to you, unless one is born again he cannot see the Kingdom of God" and in verse 5 he includes born of water and spirit. Jesus also said, "Repent and be baptised". Water baptism is the believer's declaration to the world that we have signed our lives over to follow Jesus Christ.

When I was 38 I got even with my previous hotel life. I had a wintertime baptism in a heated

hotel swimming pool with a Presbyterian Minister and an elder at the hotel.

The Holy Spirit in Creation

I can't really pinpoint a time when the Holy Spirit began to make an influence on my life but probably way back in ancient history as related to Psalm 139. When we think of the functioning of the Holy Spirit in the creation of the world, we think of omnipotence. The Holy Spirit is omnipotent, or all powerful. The Spirit of God moved upon the chaotic desolation and then came forth that which was beautiful for God and man – the formation of our world.

The Holy Spirit's work in us

The Holy Spirit leads us and guides us. It's impossible to get away from the presence of the Holy Spirit as it suggests in Psalm 139:7.

Jesus talked about His plan of eternal life for mankind in Matthew 7:13 & 14. It's been said, "the Holy Spirit is the part of the triune Godhead with oversight of the Fathers personal plan for our lives." God's plan for us is in the Spirit and the Holy Spirit is in us just waiting to help us to a rich relationship with Christ. Learning to walk with the Holy Spirit is a wonderful experience.

The Holy Spirit Gifts

In 1 Corinthians 12 – 14 we learn about the spiritual gifts given to His church. Perhaps the two greatest things mentioned are the foundation stones – unity and love. If the gifts of the Spirit are to function in any church body, these two elements must be present. Spiritual gifts are to equip us for God's service. The apostle Paul explained the need for love and unity in 1 Corinthians 12 whilst chapter 13 deals with love. I won't go into the details on the nine spiritual gifts from 1 Corinthians or the diversities of the gifts.



In my single days, I used to spend a lot of my spare time tramping and climbing in the mountains of Otago, Southland and Fiordland.

I found a closeness with the Lord on those mountains, and in the quietness, as I was often alone, I was able to enjoy wonderful prayer times. It was in those mountains I came face to face with the Holy Spirit. He taught me a heavenly

language which has been very useful over the years.

Our subject at hand is the out workings of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Neither Gillian or I are Bible teachers so can only write from our personal experience. We seek to follow the steps laid down in scripture. We have made a lot of mistakes along the way but we hold on to the promises. The first way to receive the gifts of the Spirit in our lives is by saying, "The promises are mine". There are several scriptures that show that we will not receive spiritual gifts until we actually seek after them. They will not become a part of our lives accidentally or casually. Paul told us to "covet earnestly the best gifts" and to "desire spiritual gifts", 1 Corinthians 12:31; 14:1.

The Halo question was "What do you think your gift mix is?", "How did I decide this was my gift from God?", How does using my spiritual gift assists my life and effectiveness?", "How has it made a difference in the lives of others?".

Now I have said that my working life was in structural engineering and tourist bus driving. I had God given talents that enabled me to advance in these fields. We are all born with different talents which enable us to be useful citizens.



I would say my spiritual gift mix is intercessory prayers and helps. Deciding these were my gifts from God came from a word of prophecy that the Lord wanted to use me to pray for the sick. The outworking of that is that I have been involved in various Christian gatherings where I have been asked to pray and I have seen the Lord's healing power at work through my prayers.

The gift of helps has been many and varied but mainly in serving the Lord as a preparer of food. Kitchen management on the mission field in training schools. There was never enough money at an overseas school to purchase food for the 60 or so staff and students we had to feed but through prayer and the power of the Holy Spirit we always enjoyed an abundance of food. It was intercessory prayer and the healing power of the Holy Spirit that saved Gillian from the clutches of a high grade cancerous tumour and for the second round 25 years later.

It was the Holy Spirit's intervention in our lives that opened the locked

doors of a psychiatric ward of an American Navy hospital, so Gillian and I could minister occupational therapy to the patients. Neither Gillian or I had any previous experience in that field, but we saw miracles happen in all the patients' lives. My talents in art and Gillian's ability to tell Bible stories to the palatable even to folk who appeared tormented and troubled. The Holy Spirit was working on the scene and gave us lots of new ideas. The Psychiatrist in the ward was not a Christian but the Charge Nurse was. One day we took in a Y.W.A.M. Kings Kids group who sang a bracket of songs, hymns and choruses. It so touched the heart of the Psychiatrist he threw open the locked doors so all who walked by could hear. The Lord's power can break every yoke and set people free.

To give a little detail and bring our lives more up-to-date:

When we returned to NZ we spent six months in Whangarei where Gillian underwent chemotherapy treatment. My family lived up there. Then we went back to Queenstown where I went back to work for my old friend Douglas Gordon (Frank Gordon's youngest brother) at his business A & B Engineering. We've been best friends for over 40 years. I worked

with Doug for about 20 years. The Holy Spirit helped me with many difficult times. The Spirit of the living God has directed both our lives as we have sought His direction in all our major movements and many of the smaller things too.



Quoting John 16:13, “The Spirit of truth will guide you”. Abraham Lincoln added, “I have so many evidences of God’s direction that I cannot doubt this power comes from above. I am satisfied that when The Almighty wants me to do, or not to do, any particular thing, He finds a way of letting me know”. I agree with that 100%.

I knew God’s direction in various work situations. We both had Bible direction for our missionary training long before we knew each other. The direction to the mission field was given first by two very vivid and detailed dreams I had in the Winter of 1980.

God’s timing is another thing to be aware of. God stopped my immediate passage with a range of different things He wanted to happen in my life, part of which was the addition of a wife. Final confirmation of time to go came from the voice of a travelling evangelist who pointed me out in the congregation and said, “You have waited long enough – it is time to go”. He didn’t know me or Gillian and had no previous knowledge of our lives, just a word of knowledge from the Lord, evidence of the Holy Spirit at work.

Since our return to NZ the Lord has provided our every need, physical and spiritual. We’ve been open to whatever He had in store for us and so from Whangarei to Queenstown and a few towns in between, we’ve enjoyed many wonderful experiences at our Lord’s direction. Isaiah 30:21, “Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you saying, “This is the way; walk ye in it”.
